

No Street Called Home

Hello friends,

I am very happy to be able to celebrate another year of S.A.L.V.E.'s achievements with you. A key area of success is that we have started to work more specifically with girls, whose lives on the streets are very different to boys.



We decided to be a bit cheeky and used the whole of 2018 to celebrate our 10 year anniversary! This involved some great events in both Uganda and the UK. We were lucky to host our Ugandan Director Alfred Ochaya in the UK twice in the year thanks to the Consortium for Street Children funding his visits to speak at their conferences. This meant lots of opportunities for us to thank you in person for all your support (and eat lots of cake together).

This year we are proud to say that we **resettled 73 children home** to their families with an impressive **88% success rate** (at home for 6 months or longer). This is the most children we have resettled in a year. We helped **another 25 families** to open their own businesses to let them care for their children and reduce the risk of them running away to the streets. We have also supported an incredible **105 children go to school** (and had **3 young people graduate**).

We were able to open our Halfway Home for girls on our main site. We also had a successful Big Give Christmas campaign, which has enabled us to rent a bigger and better town Drop in Centre and a special new Drop in Centre for girls.

Thank you again for all your support to build brighter futures for children living on the streets (and their families). We hope you enjoy reading about all our achievements in 2018/2019, and as ever I am available to answer any questions you might have about this report or our work in general.

Street Putreach



Halfway Homes



381 children living on the streets of Jinja used our services.

89% were boys and 11% girls.

Our support included; providing nutritious food, access to showers and washing clothes, medical care, counselling, games, classes, street walks and sports.



93 children stayed residentially in our Halfway Homes and received care. This included; having delicious food, medical care, counselling/therapy and education classes to prepare for school.

This comprised of **60 new children** from the streets, preparing to go home. As well as **33 children** from our Education Programme who needed extra support.

We opened a new, bigger Drop in Centre in Jinja in January 2019 and saw an **11% increase of children** using our services as a result.

We helped **24 children, who were** arrested for being on the streets, to leave prison.

We gave medical care to **59 children who were sick** on the streets.



We re-purposed our Emergency
House to become a Halfway
Home for girls.

This will enable us to provide better services to support girls to successfully leave the streets.

Drug Rehab



Resettlement



We were able to offer lifesaving Drug Rehabilitation services to **20** children.

We currently have a 65% success rate of children successfully overcoming their addiction with our support.



We resettled **73 children home** to their families from the streets this year.

We follow up every child to ensure they are settling in well at home. We found that an incredible 88% of them had successfully settled home.

Most of the children addicted to drugs (like aeroplane fuel) have been on the streets for many years. They have experienced a lot of trauma that needs time and care to heal.

We don't believe that change always happens immediately. Many of the children are able to successfully overcome their addiction when given a second chance.



60% of the children resettled are in education or work (age dependant).

We will continue to support the children who returned to the streets to try to successfully resettle them home.

We will also work with the children resettled home but not yet in education, or work, to help them to participate.

Education



Permaculture



105 children who formerly lived on the streets were supported to re-join education.

43 children were in boarding education and **62** in day school.

23 were girls, 82 were boys.



We invested in our 5 acre site in Jinja to develop a **learning farm**. This allows the children, and their families, to see sustainable farming ideas in practice and take classes to learn more about them.

We continued our partnership with East African Playgrounds.

We offered 12 two month internships and 5 year-long apprenticeships to young people who formerly lived on the streets to learn catering, welding and building skills.



We started a new programme for families to be trained in sustainable farming skills.

13 families have benefited from this so far; having their land assessed, and receiving the training, tools and seeds they needed as a result.



Business Training



Partnerships



We have trained **another 25 families** to start a small business this year.

We have a **77% success rate** of the businesses changing the family's lives long term. We track improvements in housing, savings, food, medical care and children attending school.



We had another successful year partnering with **Manchester University** to do community research in Uganda.

We also welcomed **Alfred, our Ugandan Director,** twice to the UK to speak at a variety of events, including an **All Party Parliamentary Group** about street children at the UK Houses of Parliament.

We expanded our S.A.L.V.E.
environmentally friendly cooking fuel
social enterprise with new machinery,
so we could increase our output.

It trains young people in a vocational skill and how to run an enterprise, as well as raising much needed funds for S.A.L.V.E. within Uganda.



The children were able to advocate for their rights in a variety of creative ways this year. They wrote their own newspaper, produced two music videos, had 12 online debates about inequality and spoke on the radio and TV.

Graduating



3 young people graduated from our education programme this year, which we are over the moon about!

They are proud of their journey from the streets to school. They are happy they can now support themselves, and their families, with the skills they gained through their education.

Michael was one of our graduates. He lived on the streets from age 9, but is now a successful motorbike mechanic.

Future plans



We recognise that any future plans we have need enough funds to make them happen. So fundraising will be a big focus of the charity next year to ensure we are able to help more children.

We are committed to continuing to learn from and improve our services.



Expenditure




Total Income: £156,117
