


Halfway Homes



We've supported 435
children living on the
streets of Jinja in the last
year through our Drop
In Centres, street walks
and sports sessions.
81% were boys and
19% were girls.

Our Street Outreach team helped 21 children leave prison and get the support they needed when they were arrested for "being idle on the streets".





Our Halfway Homes sheltered 94 children, 70 boys and 24 girls. They were given food, medical care, support, counselling and educational lessons to prepare them for home and school.

This comprised of **56 children** who were new from the streets and received rehabilitation in our Halfway Homes, as well as **38 children** in our Educational Support who needed extra care.

Home Resettlement



We've supported **21 boys**to access our innovative
Drug Rehabiliation
programme this year.
This programme is
specifically for boys as few
girls have needed
addiction support.



We resettled 68 children safely home to their family! Of these, 53 were boys and 15 were girls. We had an 85% success rate of the children remaining home long term (6 months and beyond).

Children often turn to drugs to help them to cope with the trauma of life on the street.

They need **specialist support** and care to heal and overcome their addictions.



One boy was resettled all the way back home to South Sudan!

We want to help children grow up in a loving family home and will go the extra mile to make that happen.

Education



Business Empowerment



We supported a total of
114 children to go to
school who otherwise
would not have been
able to access education.
Of these, 75% were
boys and 25% were
girls.

We were delighted to have 11 children graduate from our educational support, including our first teacher! We are excited to see what they go on to achieve next.





We trained and mentored 30 families to start a business, to help to ensure their children don't have to run away to the streets due to poverty. This included a special Single Mothers Group to give them extra support.

We supported 16 high-risk
families with special
Parenting Classes. These
classes were designed to
improve family
communication and for
parents to better
understand the traumas
children face on the streets.



Advocacy



Permaculture



We took part in 11 radio and TV shows to give children on the streets a chance to challenge negative stereotypes against them and have their stories and ideas heard.

We developed our learning farm and delivered a range of lessons in sustainable farming to the 115 children who stayed in our Halfway Homes and Drug Rehab Centre.

We hosted 12 online Inequality Question debates. The questions were chosen by the children in Uganda and we had 967 comments and 16,512 views for our online discussions.

able to sustain themselves.






This year 4 young

COVID-19 Lackdown



Future plans 2021



By the end of March all Ugandan schools were closed and a full lockdown and curfew were implemented. Our Drop in Centres temporarily closed and we formed a household bubble at our main residential site.



We will continue to advocate for and support homeless children to survive through the pandemic. We will help them move beyond it to a safe home and education.

We responded quickly by launching an **Emergency Appeal.** This helped us to provide life-saving food, soap, medical care, counselling and shelter to those who most needed it. We were blown away by the generous response.




We also plan to explore how we can help families rebuild their businesses and savings to support their families again, so that children don't turn to the streets due to poverty and hunger.

Expenditure




Total Income: £162,056

Total Expenditure: £174,485

The trustees chose to have a deficit budget to allow us to react quickly to the COVID-19 Emergency and to return the charity to our reserve level of 3 months operating costs.

For every £1 given to S.A.L.V.E.:

- 90p is spent on supporting the children and families.
- 10p is spent on running the organisation effectively or invested to generate future income.
